## Doug's Speech

jurisdiction in the State to dig ourselves out from under the Redevelopment Act. The secret is we do not spend money we do not have.

We cannot drag things out like they do in Sacramento. You would be appalled at how dysfunctional Sacramento is. If a bill survives rounds of legal review, the meat of the legislation can get gutted by a wholesale re-write or stalled in committee. Not an effective way to conduct business.

The government of Grand Terrace owes it to the citizens of our community to get things done. There is no hiding. We meet with our constituents to hear their priorities. Our

City Manager has an open-door policy. We communicate our citizen's needs to our representatives at the county, state, and federal level. We believe in hard infrastructure investment and investment in people. Afterall, we are a nation of producers, so let us produce!

Those who are hungry to succeed get their chance. My daughter worked her way through junior college, served an apprenticeship at Catholic Charities, and on to get her master's degree from the University Southern California at San Bernardino; and today she is a star in the mental health field with twenty years under her belt. downtown. Businesses continue to be attracted to our circulation. New housing

development continues. The Sheriff fights our crime. San Bernardino County fights our fires. Riverside Highland does water. The utilities do utilities.

But everything else is up to us. The Mayor and City Council. The City Manager and

his staff. Community volunteers and citizens. That is what makes Grand Terrace the

biggest little community in the largest county in the continental United States.

Today I am announcing my candidacy for Grand Terrace City Council for the November 2026 election. To that effect I pledge my knowledge, experience, and energy to the best interests of the people of the community in which I live.
